## The Cabinet (April 16<sup>th</sup>)

# Flooding: Land Drainage Roles and Responsibilities

There were several flooding incidents in the past month in Harbour Villages and around the rest of the harbour. West Sussex County Council led the emergency response. CDC, WSCC, the EA and SW all have roles depending on the circumstances.

CDC has drawn up a simple guide which explains which authority or company to approach. pdf attached.

In the longer term the intention is for Coastal Partners to develop a sustainable plan for the Chichester Harbour and coastal area to respond to flooding, sea level rise and coastal change, and to protect and restore the harbour's habitats and ecosystems.

## **Local Plan submission**

The local plan will be submitted to the Planning Inspector this week (w/c April 29), together with the evidence and suggested modifications addressing consultation feedback. Once submitted, the council's examination webpages will go live (accessed via the council's main web page address), which will contain important information regarding the next steps and updates as the Plan moves through the examination process.

## **Climate Emergency Plan**

The second Climate Emergency Plan was approved by Cabinet for consultation. CDC will consult with residents over the summer, to gain approval in 2025 for the plan when the current plan ends. The new plan would run until 2030. It focuses on helping individuals and communities in the district to reduce their emissions.

## Hyde

Hyde's social rents are set using the social formula rent which is linked to the Sept CPI values. CPI rates in Sept were 6.3%. Social rents therefore either increased by 6.3% or 7.3% depending on the current rent charged.

Service charges increased in the 2022/23 financial year mainly because of increased energy costs and high inflation. The cost of keeping homes and buildings decent and safe has also increased.

## **Unauthorised vehicle deterrents**

Earth bunds and vehicle barriers have been installed at Florence Park, Whyke Oval, Sherborne Road and Oaklands Park to deter unauthorised vehicle access and protect these

parks for the enjoyment of their local communities. The bunds have been sewn with grass seed, so they blend in with the park surroundings. Vehicle access barriers have been installed to enable legitimate entry for grounds maintenance and events purposes.

## Temporary accommodation in Bognor Regis.

CDC has secured additional temporary accommodation in Bognor Regis. This is needed to meet the increasing demand.

**The Growth & Sustainability Officer** has been progressing options to design and deliver a SME (Small and Medium Enterprise) sustainability support programme for the coming year. Several suppliers and initiatives are being reviewed – watch this space.

#### Grants

The new Grants budget for 2024/25 is £175,000. Businesses, Community Groups and other constituted organisations can apply. It is expected to be popular. Changes mean that previously supported projects may no longer fit the scheme.

From 7pm until 11pm there will be a significant amount of smoke issuing from the landmark as fire crews simulate the rescue of a young person trapped inside. Some road closures inb Chichester will be in place throughout the duration of the because firefighters will be taking water from the canal and pumping it to West Street.

## **Guildhall Open Day**

The Guildhall in Priory Park, a Grade 1 listed building built in the 1270s, is open on the first Thursday morning of every month from 11am – 12.30, to give members of the public a chance to see inside this magnificent building. Entry is free.

## Centurion Way Extension and West Dean access-ramp update

SDNPA has been working on a three-mile extension of the Centurion Way from West Dean Village to Cocking Hill where it will link with the Southdowns Way. The whole extension is forecast to be completed 2026/2027 and the first section should be open for public use in the spring of 2025.

A new access ramp to Centurion Way at West Dean was opened in March 2024 to facilitate access for all user groups.
